EXECUTIVE MESSAGE

We are committed to providing customers with excellent customer service as well as affordable and reliable electricity.

As you read this biannual report, you will see we take great pride in our work to provide low-cost power rates that are among the lowest in the nation.

Over the past two years, Cornhusker Public Power District completed a new warehouse and pole yard expansion project as well as experienced some challenging events with COVID-19 and rolling blackouts of 2021. It was during these times, Cornhusker Public Power District became stronger together and continued to provide reliable power to you, our customer.



A new six double-bay warehouse and a five bay mechanic shop was built west and north of the existing warehouse. The addition is approximately 22,000 square feet with in-floor heating throughout the new addition.



In 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic brought challenges to the District. We took necessary precautions like closing the lobby, wearing masks, and practicing social distancing, to provice a safe working environment for our employees without compromising our workflow.



Another unexpected event happened in 2021...rolling blackouts. Due to the extremely low temperatures and a low supply of natural gas, members of the Southwest Power Pool (SPP) were using more power than the combined utilities were producing. Rolling blackouts occured throughout the Midwest on February 16, 2021.

RELIABLE SERVICE

The lights stay on, in part, due to the hard work and dedication of our crews. As a result, we enjoy some of the most reliable power anywhere.







Reliable service

Over the last four years, we have been able to provide 99.956 percent reliability, based on average outage hours per customer per year.

System upgrades improve reliability

Cornhusker Public Power District works to ensure stable voltage and increase capacity when needed. We are truly powering the good life here in Eastern Nebraska. In 2020, we engineered, built, and energized 6.25 miles of 3-phase, T2 line south of Monroe and west of Fullerton. In 2021, a 3-phase voltage regulator bank and recloser was improved west of Albion.

Scoring high on operational efficiency

Cornhusker Public Power District scores high in operational efficiency compared to other state and national utilities. Average total operational expense per kilowatt hour (kWh) sold is \$.0138. This compares to the national median of \$.0254 per kWh and a state median of \$.0228 per kWh.

9,075 TESTS

9,075 poles were tested in 2020. 1,160 ground rods installed.

415 KW

262 KW of customer generation added to net billing program in 2020 in the form of small solar systems. In 2021, 153 KW was added.

3,061 HP

All irrigation load control now under one platform - Gridstream. Added 3,061 HP of irrigation in 2021.

ELECTRICAL SAFETY

awareness

It is easy to take safety for granted, but electricity is powerful and must be respected. Maintaining safety requires training, personal commitment, and constant vigilance.

Cornhusker Public Power District offers safety programs to schools and day camps. Businesses often request safety programs for their employees as well.



Schools

A total of 796 fifth and sixth grade students from 21 schools in the Cornhusker Public Power District service area participated in the safety programs in 2021.



Day camps

In 2021, 172 Boone/Nance county third grade students learned about electrical safety at the Progressive Agriculture Safety Day Camps in Albion and Fullerton.



Step potential safety programs

Step potential safety programs are given before area pesticide trainings. In 2020, 241 area farmers learned what to do if their equipment comes in contact with a powerline. In 2021, 81 farmers participated. This safety program was also presented at the Cattlemens Annual Meeting in Kearney December 2021 with Director Galen Frenzen

COMMUNITY BEYOND ELECTRIC SERVICE



Supporting agriculture, 4-H and area towns

Fair booth displays, Chamber of Commerce agribusiness events and complimentary 4-H champion exhibitor photos are ways Cornhusker Public Power District supports the ag community in our service area.

We support area towns by partnering with Loup Power District and Central Community College through a group called Community Builders.

No meetings were planned in 2020/2021 because of Covid-19. We supported area town merchants who were feeling the affects of the pandemic on their business by hosting two Boutique Runs visiting businesses in Albion, Lindsay, St. Edward, and Platte Center in 2020 and the towns of Clarkson, Leigh, Newman Grove, and Humphrey in 2021. Over 100 shoppers attended each event.

Goodwill Fund donations

Goodwill Fund donations given to area charities exceed \$398,000. Customers volunteerly round-up their bills to the nearest dollar

In 2020 and 2021, \$30,125 was given to area charities.

Education and youth - \$6,625, Community - \$10,550, Parks and memorials - \$950, Health, safety, and emergency relief - \$12,000




Chamber Vehicle Day

Source of Revenues

Residential revenues continued to constitute the largest portion of revenues at 37%. Irrigation revenues accounted for 24% of total revenues. Cornhusker Public Power District makes use of revenue in a manner that balances short-term operating expenses with long-term planning.



Utility plant worth

Cornhusker Public Power District realized a 5.9% increase in utility plant worth from year-end 2019 to year-end 2020: from \$106,647,000 to \$112,906,000. Year-end 2021, utility plant worth was \$116,906,000.



Source of Expense

When Cornhusker Public Power District breaks down the average kWh into its expense components, you can see how the percentage of each expense contributes to the overall cost. The largest expense is the cost of power, which was 70.3% of our total expense for 2021.




Operating revenue

Cornhusker Public Power District's operating revenue decreased over the past two years. In 2020, the District operated on a revenue of \$38,077,429. In 2021, the amount was \$37,465,605.

Production cost adjustment credit (PCA)

Nebraska Public Power District returned \$46.1 million in 2020 and \$73.2 million dollars in 2021 to their wholesale power customers across the state issuing a PCA credit. Cornhusker Public Power District then provided customers with a .003 cent credit for each kWh they purchased in 2020-2021 and a .005 cent kWh credit per kWh in 2021-2022.
